They heard them from storytellers all over Europe.</p>	Traditional tale	A tale that has been retold over many years.
	Character	A person or an animal in a story.
	Hero/heroine	The main character in a story. Is usually good and well liked.
	Villain	The opposite character to a hero. The villain could be mean, nasty or evil.
	Setting	Where the story is taking place.
	Fiction	Stories that describe imaginary people and events.
	Modern tale	A tale that is new and has not been retold over many years.
