



Ludgvan School – RE Curriculum Statement

Intent – what we aim to achieve through our RE Curriculum:

The intent is to ensure that children understand the relevance of RE in today's modern world and how it affects our lives. It offers opportunities for personal reflection and spiritual development, deepening the understanding of the significance of religion in the lives of others – individually, communally and cross-culturally. Through the RE curriculum, we provide opportunities to develop children's knowledge and understanding of world religions and reflect on the challenging questions that it provokes.

Implementation – how we deliver our RE Curriculum:

RE is delivered across the school through the Cornwall Agreed Syllabus. This provokes challenging questions about the meaning and purpose of life, beliefs about God, and the nature of reality, issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human. RE is generally taught on a weekly basis but is sometimes delivered through a class topic or as an RE day. Lessons are planned and delivered in a variety of ways ensuring that all children can access and participate in lessons.

Impact – how we will know how successful our RE curriculum is:

Children's hands on experiences, visits and research will help them to develop their own morals and understanding of different societies, cultures, and beliefs. All children in school will be able to talk confidently about their wellbeing, moral and cultural development for the society in which they live. The RE curriculum will promote inquisitive minds, respect, tolerance and understanding for all those around them including themselves.
